Happy Holidays to all our clients and friends. If there is any downtime in the schedule, we hope that many of you are planning on getting server maintenance done over the holidays. Perhaps you are planning on doing product upgrades that have been put off for the last few months. It's a good time to schedule these when there will be fewer developers on the network in the weeks to come. Or maybe you are thinking of retiring some of that technical debt that has been accumulating.

Once the New Year starts you will probably have a list of things that you did not have time to get done. ReleaseTEAM suggests having a realistic point of view and capture everything that could be considered 'technical debt' starting in 2015 and keep that list up to date every month throughout the year. Only by detailing the potential issues and impacts can you lay out the case for retiring the technical debt and reducing the risks which can greatly impact your entire business plan.

Here are some items to consider when creating this list:

- When is the last time you tried to restore SCM baseline from backup?
- When was the last backup? Where is it? Is there enough memory allocated for a full backup?
- What are the end of support dates for each of your tools used in the software development tool stack?
- What is the current version of each tool and what version are you using?
- Is there a formal SW development process and do the last three developers you hired follow it?
- Who last looked at the architecture of the business critical systems?

SW Architecture is probably the last thing people think about when assessing technical debt; there are so many other obvious problems that it often gets overlooked. Dave Farley's most recent Weblog from November 21, 2014 digs deeper on this and other topics associated to this theme with 'The Reactive Manifesto'.

The Puzzler

Here is last month's question:

Shawn is on a dangerous adventure in Minnesota. Suddenly an extremely poisonous snake bites him. Luckily, he has his medicines with him against this deadly snake poison: two bottles, labeled A and B, containing three pills each. Exactly three times, with an interval of 2 hours, he needs to swallow simultaneously both a pill A and a pill B. In a rush, he takes a pill from bottle A and then shakes a pill from bottle B with it... However, unfortunately two pills B fall from the bottle and they look completely identical to pill A. He cannot tell which pill was A, and which two are B pills... Shawn is desperate: if he does not take the pills exactly as prescribed, it will be fatal.

How can Shawn be sure to take the right pills?

Solution:

There are a few solutions, but they all involve cutting the pills in half. If he cuts all the pills in his hand in half, and separate the halves into two piles. Each pile will have half an A pill and 1 whole B pill. Then take another A pill, cut it in half, add each half to each pile. Take the first pile as the first dose, second pile as second dose, and the remaining pills as a normal third dose.
